TRY TO: ☐ Take your micro and econometrics core (100 and 120 series). Consider adding a minor in math, computer science, or accounting. Check out the American Economics Association web page which includes earnings data by major, advice on how to prepare for grad school in economics, and careers for those with economics degrees. Enroll in our <u>one-unit honors courses</u> (3.5 GPA required) . These are excellent ways to connect with faculty and a great connection may lead to an informed letter of recommendation someday! SPRING Quarter: Apply to take <u>ECON 191A/B</u>. It is a great way to learn to conduct your own research, as well as connect with a faculty member. (3.5 GPA required)
